## Interesting Records 2007

An iridescent metallic beetle associated with wet habitats, quite common over most of Britain.

In Great Britain this species is classified as Local. It is classified by the IUCN (1996) as globally Vulnerable.

The shining guest ant is a commensal species that lives in the nests of *Formica rufa* wood ants. The tiny worker ants are rarely seen but occasionally wander over the surface of the wood ant nest on warm, overcast days in autumn. It appears to be quite widespread and common in Wyre Forest but is under recorded.

Image shows a male, the female has a very long ovipositor with a white tip. Species common in southern England but rare in Worcestershire. Often occurs on Umbelliferae flowers. The larvae are parasites of solitary bee larvae.



Lemon Slug Malacolimax (Limax) tenellus

A small yellow slug with dark tentacles. Considered an Ancient Woodland indicator species and rather scarce and local in England, Wales and Scotland. Found in autumn when it feeds on fungi especially it seems on the yellow *Russula ochroleuca*!
